MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN



Ten years ago, in 2016, Mumbai First had the privilege of convening the **first BRICS Friendship Cities Conclave in Mumbai**. That gathering was

founded on a simple but enduring belief: no city has all the answers, but every city has something to teach and something to learn. The 2026 Conclave builds upon that foundation at a time when the challenges confronting cities have become more interconnected, urgent and global.

India has once again, taken over the Presidency of the BRICS Nations and we were honoured to host the **BRICS Friendship Cities Conclave 2026 in Mumbai on 11th & 12th August**, with the support of the Government of India and the Government of Maharashtra.

The two-day Conclave brought together policymakers, city leaders, experts, institutions and practitioners from across the BRICS countries to deliberate on the critical urban challenges of our time - **climate and environmental resilience, coastal risks, extreme heat, mobility, circular economy, housing, air pollution, and AI-enabled urban governance**. We were privileged to welcome city leaders, government representatives, urban practitioners, diplomats, researchers and industry leaders from BRICS Nations and Partner countries. The gathering reaffirmed an important proposition: while cities differ in history, scale and circumstance, many of the challenges they confront are shared—and there is considerable value in learning from one another's experience.

The future of the world will, to a large extent, be shaped in its cities. Cities are where the consequences of climate change

are increasingly felt, where millions seek opportunities and a better quality of life, and where innovation must translate into solutions that are practical, inclusive and sustainable.

Climate change gives this work an urgency that cannot be overstated. For a coastal metropolis such as Mumbai, resilience is not simply an environmental objective; it is inseparable from public health, infrastructure security, economic competitiveness, social equity and the protection of livelihoods. The Conclave reinforced the importance of moving from reactive responses towards anticipatory planning—combining evidence, community engagement, nature-based solutions, sound engineering and long-term investment.

Mumbai is particularly well placed to help anchor this effort. As the host city, and as a city with experience of urban complexity, ambition and public-private collaboration, Mumbai can serve as a trusted convenor of continuing BRICS urban cooperation. Our role is not to prescribe one model for all cities, but to facilitate exchange, encourage practical action and help ensure that shared knowledge is translated into solutions appropriate to each city's institutional, environmental and social context.

Artificial intelligence can increasingly support this endeavour by strengthening service delivery, planning, mobility and the early identification of urban risks. Yet its use must rest on secure and interoperable data, institutional capability, transparency and human judgement. Technology must remain a means of advancing public purpose and improving citizens' lives.

Mumbai First has always believed that Mumbai's future will be shaped by collaboration among government, industry, institutions, civil society and citizens.

MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

The **BRICS Friendship Cities Conclave 2026** has renewed that conviction. By carrying its momentum forward through sustained partnerships. Mumbai can continue its journey towards becoming a *ville de premier ordre*: a city of the first rank, measured not only by its economic strength and global standing, but by its liveability, fairness, resilience and capacity to create opportunity for all.

Let this Conclave be remembered, not merely for the conversations we had but for the collaboration we began, not merely for the friendships celebrated but for the future we build together. HEAT STRESS MITIGATION PROJECT

Project Overview:

The Heat Mitigation Project aims to understand and reduce the impact of extreme heat on vulnerable communities in Mumbai through data-driven interventions and community-based solutions. The project is being implemented with the support of GATES Foundation and focuses on assessing indoor heat exposure in informal settlements and testing practical heat-resilient technologies at the household level.

The project is being implemented across selected households in M-East Ward, and L Ward of Mumbai.

Objectives of the Project:

- To assess indoor heat stress levels in vulnerable urban households.
- To understand community experiences, coping mechanisms, and challenges during extreme heat events.
- To create awareness among communities regarding heat risks and preventive measures.
- To identify and implement practical, low-cost heat-resilient solutions for households.
- To evaluate the effectiveness of heat-resilient technologies through scientific monitoring and evidence-based assessment.
- To develop scalable community-based heat mitigation strategies for urban informal settlements.

A. ROUNDTABLE ON DISSEMINATION OF HEAT-HEALTH GUIDELINES FOR VULNERABLE COMMUNITIES IN MUMBAI

On 20th February 2026, Mumbai First convened a focused roundtable on **Dissemination of Heat-Health Guidelines for Vulnerable Communities in Mumbai** bringing together municipal officials, researchers, and practitioners to discuss proposed heat-health guidelines and develop subsequent community-level dissemination strategies among informal settlements in K East, M east and L ward of Mumbai.

Key findings from field research and draft Heat-Health Guidelines were reviewed with partners including **SPARC** and the **Public Health Foundation of India**. Discussions focused on strengthening emergency response protocols, improving dissemination mechanisms, and translating heat-action guidelines into practical, on-ground interventions for vulnerable communities.

B. TECHNICAL WORKSHOP ON AFFORDABLE HEAT RESILIENT HOUSING SOLUTIONS

Recognising the urgent need to address heat stress in informal settlements, Mumbai First, with support from the Gates Foundation, launched a project focused on advancing heat mitigation efforts in Mumbai.

As part of this initiative, a **“Technical Workshop on Building Climate-Resilient Communities: Exploring Affordable Heat-Resilient Housing Solutions for Slum Communities in Mumbai”** was organised to discuss practical and scalable approaches for strengthening climate resilience in vulnerable communities bringing together private companies, architects, and NGOs working on climate-responsive housing and sustainable construction solutions.

C. ON-GROUND DISSEMINATION OF HEAT-HEALTH ADVISORIES THROUGH PAMPHLETS & STREET PLAYS

Subsequent to the roundtable discussion and technical workshop organized between February and April, a set of Heat-Health Guidelines were developed with the support of **Public Health Foundation of India (PHFI)**. The guidelines were designed to be technically sound while remaining simple, practical, and accessible for community use, particularly within vulnerable and informal settlements.

2 Nukkad Natak (street theatre) sessions were also conducted to communicate key heat-health messages in a simple, engaging, and culturally relevant manner.

The Nukkad Natak sessions, performed by students of the NSS units - Thakur College Mumbai, focused on recognising symptoms of heat stress, maintaining hydration, protecting vulnerable groups, reducing exposure during peak heat hours, and adopting simple household-level measures to reduce heat-related risks. These plays were particularly effective in reaching community members who may not typically engage with written information materials.

D. SELECTION OF HOUSEHOLDS FOR RETROFITTING

In the aftermath of the technical workshop, conducted in April 2026, Mumbai First brought together technical experts working in climate-resilient housing and urban resilience & enabled the identification of practical and affordable retrofitting options suitable for dense informal settlements.

Given the specialized nature of the retrofitting work, Mumbai First took support from **SPARC** to implement climate-resilient housing interventions within informal settlements. Suitable interventions are currently being deployed and will be adequately assessed in the coming months.

GATES FOUNDATION SUPPORTED INITIATIVES

AIR POLLUTION MITIGATION PROJECT

Project Overview:

The Air Local Initiative by Mumbai First aims to address the growing challenge of air pollution in Mumbai through scientific assessment, hyperlocal monitoring, and evidence-based mitigation strategies. As part of the initiative, two highly pollution-affected areas Sion and Chandivali have been identified as pilot locations for detailed study and intervention.

The project is being implemented in partnership with Techknowgreen Solutions Ltd. to conduct hyperlocal air-quality studies that identify pollution hotspots and source contributions at the neighbourhood level. The initiative focuses on generating scientific data, developing localized action plans, and promoting targeted interventions to improve urban air quality and public health outcomes.

Objectives of the Project:

- To develop an emission inventory covering major and minor pollution-generating activities.
- To conduct air-quality monitoring through mobile-vehicle deployment and existing MPCB data.
- To undertake dispersion modelling for identifying pollution patterns and source impacts.
- To design and implement localized air-quality action plans for targeted mitigation.
- To disseminate key findings and outcomes among stakeholders and communities for informed decision-making.

STRENGTHENING THE MECHANISM OF PRIMARY HEALTH CENTRES (PHCS)

Project Overview:

The project aims to strengthen the preparedness and climate resilience of Primary Health Care Centres (PHCs) in Mumbai by improving infrastructure, service delivery, and heat-illness response systems. The project also aims to build community awareness, enhance PHC staff capacity, and support the development of institutionalized heat action measures through data-driven interventions and stakeholder collaboration.

Objectives of the Project:

- To conduct mapping and baseline assessments of PHCs across selected wards.
- To organise focus group discussions with PHC staff to identify operational challenges during heatwaves.
- To analyse heat-risk data, medical records, and secondary datasets to identify vulnerable areas and trends.
- To develop and deliver training workshops and tele-advisory support for PHC teams.
- To procure and distribute essential heat-illness management kits and infrastructure support to PHCs.
- To disseminate findings, recommendations, and preventive health practices to communities and stakeholders.

Expected Outcomes:

- Strengthened PHC systems with improved readiness for heat-related illnesses.
- Data-driven understanding of heat vulnerability in urban slum areas.
- Skilled PHC workforce equipped for seasonal health risks.
- Informed communities practicing heat-preventive behaviours.

STAKEHOLDERS' CONSULTATION IN THANE & MUMBAI

A. STAKEHOLDER CONSULTATION ON SUB-CITY HEAT ACTION PLAN FOR THANE



5th May 2026: Consultation organized at CREDAI-MCHI, Thane

Heat is no longer simply a seasonal concern - it is increasingly being recognised as a disaster and a critical urban resilience challenge. At Mumbai First, through our ongoing heat resilience work, we are looking to strengthen heat mitigation efforts not only at the city level, but also through more localised, sub-city and ward-level approaches.

With the support of **Ms. Sujata Saunik, former Chief Secretary, Government of Maharashtra**, Mumbai First organised two Sub-City Heat Consultations in Thane and Mumbai on 5 May 2026 and 8 May 2026, respectively. The consultations brought together representatives from municipal corporations, civil society organisations, technical experts, and private-sector partners to explore how heat action strategies can become more localised, targeted, and impactful.

B. STAKEHOLDER CONSULTATION ON SUB-CITY HEAT ACTION PLAN FOR MUMBAI

The discussions recognised that the impacts of extreme heat can vary significantly across neighbourhoods. This makes it important to move beyond broad citywide strategies and develop ward-level solutions that respond to local vulnerabilities, are practical, and can be effectively implemented.

Building on these consultations, Mumbai First is now working towards developing Sub-City Heat Action Guidelines for Mumbai and Thane, with the aim of translating broader heat resilience strategies into more locally relevant and actionable interventions.

MULTI-STAKEHOLDER CONSULTATION

MULTI-STAKEHOLDER CONSULTATION ON IMPACT OF EXTREME HEAT ON CARDIOVASCULAR-KIDNEY-METABOLIC DISEASES (CKMDs)

Mumbai First, in collaboration with HRIDAY, the Healthy India Alliance, and the Public Health Foundation of India (PHFI) – JSW Centre for Climate Change & Health, organised a multi-stakeholder consultation in Mumbai on 4 August 2026 on the impact of extreme heat on Cardiovascular-Kidney-Metabolic Diseases (CKMDs). The consultation brought together perspectives from public health, climate action, government, urban governance, civil society and community stakeholders to examine



Maharashtra's emerging heat-related health risks and the preparedness of existing health systems and Heat Action Plans. The consultation sought to move beyond identifying risks towards developing practical, state-specific and context-responsive policy and implementation pathways. A key component of the consultation was the co-development of priority actions for a Maharashtra Heat and CKMD Roadmap.

Participants worked across three thematic groups focusing on Health Systems and Service Delivery; Climate Governance, Urban Systems and Local Government Action; and Community Engagement, Civil Society Action and Lived Experience Perspectives. The recommendations emerging from the working groups were subsequently synthesized through a joint discussion, with attention to identifying system-level bottlenecks, enabling factors and actionable interventions.

The consultation therefore served as a platform for connecting evidence with implementation and bringing different institutional perspectives into a common policy conversation.



The consultation concluded with a discussion on strengthening Maharashtra's response to heat and CKMDs, followed by consolidation of recommendations and key takeaways. A follow-up consultation is expected in the coming months to take forward the emerging roadmap and recommendations.

The MSF bi-monthly meeting at IIT Bombay brought together IIT faculty, Mumbai First, NGOs, recyclers, and industry to deepen collaboration on Mumbai's climate and sustainability agenda.

IIT experts presented on climate change impacts for Mumbai, especially rising heatwaves, short-duration high-intensity rainfall, urban flooding, and sea-level rise, and offered to develop scenario maps of future flood-prone areas.

Building for Resilience, Innovation, Cooperation and Sustainability

Mumbai First, in collaboration with the Government of India and the Government of Maharashtra, hosted the BRICS Friendship Cities Conclave 2026 on 11-12 August in Mumbai.

Under the backdrop of India's BRICS Presidency, the program delivered a two-day international dialogue under the theme **"Building for Resilience, Innovation, Cooperation and Sustainability"**.

His Excellency Shri Jishnu Dev Verma, Hon'ble Governor of Maharashtra, and **Shri Eknath Shinde**, Hon'ble Deputy Chief Minister of Maharashtra and the Minister of Urban Development, Government of Maharashtra graced the inaugural function. Delegations from Brazil, Russia, China, South Africa, Indonesia, Egypt, Iran and Malaysia, Consul Generals, senior Indian government officials, and India-based industries, civil society organizations and academic institutions were also present in the gathering.

The Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs (MoHUA) and the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) played a key role as the nodal agencies, assisting in the development of the program agenda and facilitating the participation of BRICS delegations to Mumbai. **Shri Shambhu Hakki**, India's BRICS Sous-Sherpa, and Joint Secretary (MER & G20), Ministry of External Affairs, Government of India represented the support of the Central Governmental Ministries at the Conclave.

Witnessing BRICS nations undergo unprecedented urban transformation, marked by intensified pressures on infrastructure, public services, ecological systems, and governance institutions, the Conclave identified 6 thematic areas viz., Coastal Resilience; Urban Heat Stress Mitigation; Low-Carbon Transport; Clean Air; Affordable Housing; AI-enabled Urban Governance.

Mr. Narinder Nayar, Chairman, Mumbai First, highlighted the need for city-to-city cooperation to address global challenges through locally rooted solutions.

Mr. Ashank Desai, Vice-Chairman, Mumbai First, offered the Vote of Thanks and emphasised the commitment to advancing meaningful global urban collaboration.

- ➔ Effective heat mitigation requires a combination of nature-based solutions, climate-responsive design, heat-risk mapping, shaded infrastructure and passive cooling measures, supported by coordinated planning.
- ➔ Early-warning systems, granular vulnerability data, health surveillance and targeted interventions are critical to protecting vulnerable populations from extreme heat.

- ➔ Low-carbon mobility requires the integration of appropriate mass transit, fleet electrification, active mobility, intelligent traffic management, last-mile connectivity and sustainable financing.
- ➔ Successful transition to electric mobility depends on robust charging and battery-swapping infrastructure, sustainable financing and data-driven traffic management, alongside a shift towards public and active transport.
- ➔ Mumbai can prioritize BEST fleet expansion and electrification, stronger metro-bus integration, reliable first- and last-mile connectivity and diversified non-fare revenue streams to build a financially sustainable low-carbon transport system.

KNOWLEDGE SESSION: CLOSED-DOOR LEADERSHIP EXCHANGE

The Knowledge Session on Innovative Urban Development Solutions for BRICS Cities, held on 12 August 2026, brought together senior representatives from government, city administrations, international institutions and industry for a closed-door focused exchange on practical and scalable approaches to urban development in the BRICS ecosystem.

Mr. Rakesh Lunia from Tata Consultancy Services spoke about the need to rethink the way smart cities are conceived and developed, with a strong emphasis on community-centric urban development. His intervention highlighted the importance of building smart cities around communities and their needs, rather than creating systems that remain excessively dependent on government. The approach emphasised greater community participation and ownership in shaping urban solutions.

Ms. Railssa Peluti Alencar, Deputy Consul General of Brazil in Mumbai, presented on "Urban Transportation: The experience of URBS (Urbanização de Curitiba S.A.) and IPPUC (Instituto de Pesquisa e Planejamento Urbano de Curitiba) in sustainable urban mobility and city planning." Her intervention brought an international city-planning perspective from Brazil, focusing on the experience of Curitiba and the relationship between sustainable mobility and long-term urban planning.

Mr. Danny Salvia presented GeoAI and 3D City Twins as a new "spatial operating system" for cities, highlighting the shift from conventional GIS-based documentation towards dynamic, predictive urban governance. Using the mapping of Dharavi as a key example, he explained how LiDAR, terrestrial mobile scanners and panoramic cameras can generate high-precision 3D spatial data to support structured property records, infrastructure planning, emergency routing and redevelopment modelling while recognising existing economic and community networks. He then introduced the concept of a Mumbai City Twin and its



potential applications across infrastructure, public health, climate resilience, traffic management, and energy and water systems. The presentation ultimately proposed a transition from conventional "Smart Cities" to "Wiser Cities", where high-fidelity digital twins, GeoAI and AI-driven systems enable cities to anticipate challenges, simulate interventions and continuously improve urban decision-making.

Dr. Karimi from Iran presented "Tehran Housing and Regeneration Change: Housing as the Axis of Urban Development." His presentation examined housing as a central component of urban welfare and development in Tehran, covering housing cooperatives and collective welfare, long-term demographic growth, demographic transition and changing residential preferences, internal migration and housing affordability, residential patterns and spatial inequality, commuting and urban expansion, and comparisons with other Iranian megacities. The presentation concluded by drawing attention to the policy implications of these interconnected housing and urban development trends.

The BRICS Friendship Cities Expo brought together organisations from the technology, government, academia and civil society sectors, creating a platform to showcase innovative solutions, initiatives and approaches to urban development. The Expo featured TCS, Genesys, SDA Bocconi, Dasra, and the Consulates of China, Egypt, South Africa, and Russia.

The Expo also served as a networking and engagement space, allowing delegates to interact with organisations and learn more about their work, technologies and initiatives. It reflected the Conclave's emphasis on connecting city governments, industry and civil society to explore practical urban solutions.

The showcase further strengthened the international character of the Conclave by creating a common platform for knowledge exchange, collaboration and visibility among participating organisations and delegates.

In their valedictory addresses, **Dr. Kilaparti Ramakrishna** identified cross-cutting priorities across the six sessions, emphasising that shared principles must be adapted to local contexts and called for institutionalised, continuous cooperation among BRICS cities. **Smt. Ashwini Bhide** highlighted that cities are home to over half of the global population and

generating more than 80% of global economic output, are central to addressing climate and development challenges. She advocated direct city partnerships, shared digital knowledge platforms and long-term institutional mechanisms for cooperation. The **Late Mr. Gul Kripalani**, Governing Board Member, Mumbai First, emphasised that the success of the conclave would

ultimately be measured by the partnerships and public-private collaborations that emerge beyond the event. **Vice-Admiral Girish Luthra (Retd.)**, Governing Board Member, Mumbai First, concluded the session by highlighting the need to translate dialogue into local action and establish the conclave as the foundation of a sustained partnership among BRICS cities.
